THE ROUTE 20 SPRING

On October 30, the Board of Selectmen conducted a public informational meeting on the Route 20 Spring. Selectman Bill Elovirta reviewed the background involving the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection order to the Town to eliminate coliform bacteria or close the spring.

The Annual Town Meeting appropriated up to \$15,000 to contract with an engineering firm for a design and a cost estimate to bring the Rt. 20 Spring into compliance with state DEP standards.

The Town contracted with Housatonic Basin of Lee to perform the work, and they delivered their report in early October. The estimated cost to install a U-V water purification system is \$85,430, not including costs for easement agreements with the two private property owners, a back-up generator and insurance. A rough estimate of the complete cost is in the range of \$100,000. Housatonic Basin estimates the annual operating costs to be \$2,515, not including electricity.

The design and cost estimates from Housatonic Basin are available on the Becket website. The Selectmen will review options for the Route 20 Spring at their next meeting on November 7.

As we get ready for winter here in the Berkshires, our town has seen some new growth with the addition of a K-9 unit to our police force. Recently the town received a grant for Police Officer Michael Hunt to receive training and obtain a German Shepherd puppy to go out on patrols with him in a retro-fitted K-9 patrol car. This will add many benefits to our police force including search and rescue, contraband sniffing capability and an additional member of the force to locate criminals. It is hoped that the puppy can visit Becket Washington School to teach the children about our four-footed friend. Congratulations Becket Police Department and Officer Hunt.

In addition to our Police update, our Fire Department will repair or replace the antenna tower on the side of Fire Station #1 due to loosened guy wires on the tower attached to the roof and the ground. We thank Chief Hanford for the update and a sharp-eyed resident for pointing out the maintenance issue. We expect to sell some of the Fire Department's surplus gear in the coming weeks if approved at the next Selectmen's meeting on Nov. 7th.

NEW TOWN HALL HVAC SYSTEM

The Town has received a \$12,500 grant from the state Department of Energy Resources to hire a consultant to review the options for a new Town Hall HVAC system.

The initial plan, funded at the 2017 Annual Town Meeting, was to replace the existing oil fired system with a new propane based plant.

More recently, there have been advances in electricity based, heat pump technology, and some communities are taking advantage of a state subsidy program to install this technology. One interesting proposal is to use the green field adjacent to Town Hall to develop a land-based array of solar panels which could provide power for heat pumps and supply a significant portion of the electricity consumed at Town Hall.

There are a number of questions that need to be resolved before the Town makes a decision on a new HVAC system: Are new heat pumps reliable on the coldest days? Will heat pumps require an electrical baseboard back up system? Can the state grant fund the cost instead of using the funds appropriated at the 2017 Town Meeting?

The consultant will be hired before the end of this year to provide advice and a recommendation on the best system. The Town anticipates applying for a new round of Green Communities grant funds in February 2019 which could fund the HVAC system.

TOWN ADMINISTRATOR SEARCH

The Town Administrator Screening Committee is continuing to work with Bernard Lynch of Community Paradigm Associates to identify a permanent Town Administrator. In September, the Screening Committee and Mr. Lynch completed their work and recommended a top notch candidate. The Selectmen interviewed this candidate but were informed that he would not accept an appointment unless the salary was increased by \$20,000 more than the \$72,000 budgeted at the Annual Town Meeting.

This was the second time this year that a high quality applicant for Town Administrator refused an offer from the Selectmen. Last summer, the Selectmen voted to hire a candidate who then declined to accept the appointment.

A number of towns in our region are in the market for a new Town Administrator. Salaries have been rising across Berkshire County and in the Connecticut Valley. It is likely that the Selectmen may bring the issue of the Town Administrator salary for discussion before a Special Town Meeting expected to take place in December of January.

The goal of the Selectmen is to identify an Administrator who will live in Becket or a surrounding town and who will commit to serving the Town for an extended period.
