The proposed change intended to reduce ambiguity in the application of driveway regulations throughout the community given the many different state, town, and district agencies and associations involved in the permitting process.

Formative changes that are codified and contextual are as follows:

Driveways: Driveway access to public and private ways is permitted by right with concurrence of the State's, Town's or District's Highway/Superintendent and in case where this is not possible applicants may apply for a Special Permit from the Planning Board.

Access/Location/Site Distances: All driveways shall be constructed in a manner ensuring reasonable and safe access from the road servicing to within or less than one hundred (100) feet from the building or residential structure. Driveways shall maintain clear site line distance especially at intersections for the safety of vehicles and pedestrians and shall not be located within eighteen (18) feet of a sideline.

Road-Line Angle/Grade/Distance: The intersection with the road line shall not be less than 90 degrees for a distance of twenty (20) feet into the lot and the grade shall not exceed three (3%) in this area.

Width/Surface/Drainage: Driveways shall have minimum cleared width of (twelve) 12 feet at the entrance to the road for the first twenty (20) feet, be construct of approved graded material. Water from the driveway shall not drain on the road or abutter property.

Environmental/Maintenance/Numbering: Any adjacent disturbed areas during construction of a driveway shall be stabilized and planted with ground cover prior to completion. Residential address numbers shall be clearly displayed at the intersection of the driveway entrance with the road. Maintenance of the driveway curb cut shall be maintained to the satisfaction of the approving authority.

WARRANT ARTICLE EXPLANATIONS-FY2018

Stabilization Fund: \$703,684.15

Ambulance Enterprise Stabilization: \$40,000.00 Certified Free Cash Available: \$417,342.00

Certified Ambulance Free Cash Available: \$17,537.00

Article 1:

This Article is for the payment of bills which were incurred in a previous fiscal year. There is one bills totaling \$165.00 which the Town has been made aware of which was submitted by Carr Hardware for rental equipment for last fiscal year. The invoice was sent to a different department than the one who used the equipment. A 4/5 Vote is required to pass this Article and allow payment of this invoice.

Article 2:

According to State Law, Town Meeting must "fix" or set the rate of pay received by elected officials. This Article sets the rate of pay for members of the Board of Selectmen at \$2,040.00 each per year, which is the same as the rate for the current fiscal year, and allows the elected members of the Board of Health and Cemetery Commission to perform work for their respective boards at the rate of \$14.85 per hour which contains a 2% Cost of Living Adjustment.

Article 3:

This Article constitutes the Municipal Budget for Fiscal Year 2017. The budget has been developed jointly by the Finance Committee, Board of Selectmen and Town Administrator who all are in agreement on the specific line item amounts. Major points of the budget include the following:

- Town employee's wages are based on all employees receiving a 2% Cost of Living Adjustment. However, there is one (1) less day in the FY 2018 payroll year as there was during the FY 2017 payroll scheduled year.
- The Town's operating assessment from the Central Berkshire Regional School District has increased 7.57 % or \$143,649 this year which has caused considerable constraints in the Town's fiscal year 2018 budget. We are one of the only communities who is showing a rise in school enrollment.
- The Town Secretary's salary also reflects a change of job duties and increase responsibilities as of January 1, 2017 primarily due to the requirements of the new Massachusetts Public Records Law.
- The Clerk of Committee's position salary has been changed to be reflected in one line item (new account) this year. This position was previously funded through the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Appeals, Board of Health and staff Coverage accounts. Those accounts have been reduced proportionally for the upcoming fiscal year to reflect the transfer of funds into one account.
- We are expecting an increase of two additional students attending Vocational High School for the 2017 2018 school year. This is an increase of \$14.45 % or \$27,897.
- Election-Registration account is decreased this fiscal year due to the reduced number of elections and primaries.
- Reserve Fund is reduced by \$5,000 for the upcoming fiscal year for unforeseen expenses due to the unusual budget constraints.

- Conservation account is increased due to the request for increased hours for the Conservation Agent due to
 increased activity and filing of applications and Notices of Determination. This will increase the average
 hours for the Conservation Agent to 17.5 per week.
- The cost for Highway Department Summer Labor and Winter Road Salaries increased to include the 2% COLA. Due to the breakdown of how the summer and winter hours fall into the payroll schedule the actual increase may vary slightly from 2%
- Highway Department Machinery account is decreased slightly this year due to less planned repairs to the equipment. The funding to repair the backhoe was done in the FY 2017 budget.
- The Highway Department Fuel account has increased slightly due to the increase in the required fuel system monitoring costs.
- Highway Department General Maintenance Material and Equipment account has been increased this year due to a planned increase in the amount of Gravel/Stone to be purchased for the maintenance of gravel roads. This account was severely underfunded and an effort is being made to increase this account up to \$45,000 over a period of four years.
- Transfer Station Expenses has increased due to expected increased trucking costs and anticipated increases for a new contract with a vendor for services supplied to operate the Transfer Station.
- Tree Account is increased as in addition to trees in the public way the Town also removes trees in our parks and cemeteries when necessary.
- Police Department Salaries is increased this year due to having one full time officer in the Police Academy for twenty-six weeks. This will require the payment of salary to the officer while in the Academy as well as another officer during the same time frame to be on duty. We are hopeful that this will be a one-time occurrence and won't happen again for a number of years.
- Police department Expenses decreased slightly mainly due to payment for tuition into the full-time Police Academy will occur during the current fiscal year and not during FY 2018.
- Demolition Fund budget has increased slightly due to the requirement to do asbestos surveys before demolishing buildings.
- Call Fire Stipends is decreased slightly this year due to a decrease in the number of volunteer firefighters who are expected to be eligible for the stipend after a successful recruiting year for volunteer firefighters. To be eligible to receive this stipend the volunteers must attend 50% of the meetings and 50% of the fire calls.
- Building and Code Inspectors Expense has decreased due to the fact that the purchase of the newest edition
 of the revised Building Code Manual was done in the current 2017 fiscal year and will not have to be
 repeated.
- Board of Health Expenses has increased due to the increased workload of inspections and enforcement for the Health Agent who is contracted to work for the Board of Health through the Berkshire Health Alliance.
- Veterans Benefits has increased due to additional Veterans who are eligible for benefits. The Town receives a reimbursement of 75% of the costs of these benefits from the State in the fiscal year after the benefits have been paid.
- General Insurance (property, casualty and workers comp.) has received a slight increase mainly due to an increase in our property values.

- Municipal Building Expenses has been decreased slightly for FY 2018 due to the budgetary constraints.
- Municipal Utilities has been decreased to reflect the decrease in the electricity usage rates through our newly negotiated contract for electricity supply.
- Parks and Recreation has requested an increase due to pay increases for summer help, additional hours for guards at the access of the Town Beach and a new Yoga program along with replacement of picnic tables.
- Health Insurance has increased primarily due to a 4.00% increase in rates. The range of increases for the program we participate in for municipalities this year was from a low of four percent to a high of eleven percent.
- County Retirement has a slight decrease for this fiscal year due to the predetermined funding requirement and the actuarial study performed for Berkshire County Retirement.

Article 4:

This Article provides for the annual bond payments due for debt previously approved by the Town for the specific purposes noted. EFP = Ending Fiscal Year Final Payment.

Article 5:

The Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee strongly recommended that a substantial portion of this year's Certified Free Cash be appropriated back to the Stabilization fund. The Board of Selectmen and Finance Committee believe it is important to have a substantial balance in the Stabilization Fund to protect against unexpected circumstances and maintain a strong financial position which helps reduce borrowing costs. The Finance Committee has recommended a Financial Reserve Policy which the Board of Selectmen has approved recommending that 50% of the Town's Certified Free Cash each year be appropriated into the Stabilization Fund. The current balance including appropriations from last year is \$703,684.15. If this Article passes, the balance would increase to \$912,355.15. A majority vote is required for this article.

Article 6:

This article allows the Town to expend Chapter 90 funds provided by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts for the improvement of local roads.

Article 7:

This Article provides funding for the Ambulance Department for the previously approved Ambulance Enterprise Fund for fiscal year 2018 by using \$270,574 of property taxes and \$115,000.00 from Ambulance receipts for a total of \$385,574.

Article 8:

This article will appropriate \$18,500 to have an Auditing Firm perform an audit of the Town's Fiscal Year 2017 financial records.

<u>Article 9</u>: This article will appropriate and transfer \$48,145.00 from Free Cash to reduce the amount of the FY 2017 Snow and Ice deficit.

Article 10:

This Article will provide funding for the legal, advertising, and related costs of acquiring those properties which are in tax title and are delinquent in paying their property taxes. Once acquired, the Town will then dispose of them through auction to put them back on the tax rolls.

Article 11:

This article seeks funding of \$10,000 for capital repairs and improvements at the Becket Athenaeum. Funding for these purposes are being requested separately from operating expenses to assure that this amount is not utilized in

the Athenaeum operating budget for calculating the minimum amount of effort required by the Commonwealth to maintain certification and state funding.

Article 12:

This Article would provide funding for the Becket Arts Center (a Town owned building) for the upgrade and improvement of replacing the front door, repairing the foundation and refurbishing the stairs to the second floor in the amount of \$5,350. This funding is requested to be transferred from Free Cash.

Article 13:

This Article will provide funding in the amount of \$38,000 to purchase, replace and install two furnaces and change the heating system to propane from oil at Fire Station #1. Funding for this Article is requested to be transferred from Free Cash.

Article 14:

This Article authorizes the purchase of a new truck in the amount of \$48,000. This vehicle will replace the existing 2007 Chevy Silverado for the Building and Grounds Department. The 2007 Chevy Silverado will be transferred to the Highway Department for the use of the Town Mechanic to pick up parts. Funding for this purchase is requested to be transferred from Free Cash.

Article 15:

This Article authorizes \$35,000 for the demolition of the house at 21 Maple Street (a Town owned property) and decommissioning the well and septic systems along with filling, grading and seeding the hole from the cellar foundation. Funding for this purchase is requested to be transferred from the Overlay Surplus Fund.

Article 16:

This Article authorizes the transfer of \$39,911 from Free Cash for the purpose of reducing the FY 2018 tax rate.

Article 17:

This Article would provide funding in the amount of \$6,900 for materials to improve the erosion control and add a drainage swale and sand at the Town Beach. Funding for this improvement is requested to be transferred from Free Cash.

Article 18:

This Article authorizes the purchase/replacement of the telephone answering and voicemail system as well as the telephones in Town Hall in the amount of \$12,200. The current telephone system is beyond the end of its useful life and when parts are still available for repairs they are not warrantied. Funding for this replacement is requested to be transferred from Free Cash.

Article 19:

This Article seeks funding in the amount of \$5,000 for the purchase of a new replacement mower and grass catcher for the North Becket Cemetery. The current mower and engine have required a good deal of repairs to keep it functioning over the past several years. Funding to replace this mower is requested to be transferred from Free Cash.

Article 20:

This article seeks funding in the amount of \$5,000 for the purpose of indexing, printing and binding of the Town By-Laws. This appropriation has been requested by the Bylaw Review Committee. It is my understanding that it has been quite a number of years since this was last done. Funding for this is requested to be transferred from Free Cash.

Article 21:

This article seeks funding for the purchase of a new Ambulance for the Ambulance Department to be housed at Fire Station #2/Ambulance Garage in the amount of \$250,000. The article will authorize the borrowing of \$250,000 for the purchase of the new Ambulance for replacement of the existing 2011 Ford F450 vehicle. The Selectmen will trade, sell or otherwise dispose of the existing 2011 F450 Ambulance. A 2/3 Vote is required.

Article 22:

This Article would reauthorize the three (3) Revolving Accounts which would provide for Public Safety inspections (wiring, plumbing and gas) to be paid out of the appropriate Revolving Account. This method allows more flexibility to account for activity in such inspections and allows the part time inspectors to be paid from the funds collected from applicants for wiring, plumbing and gas permits. The amounts noted are only to set a maximum level which can be received and paid each year in each of the funds and do not involve a direct appropriation. As such, these funds have no impact on the tax rate. These funds must be authorized annually.

Article 23:

As required by the Community Preservation Act (CPA), this Article authorizes an initial designation of an estimated \$49,088 in Community preservation Funds as follows: Administrative Expenses - \$500, \$4,859 or ten (10) percent for a Reserve in each of the three (3) required categories (Historical Preservation, Community Housing, and Open Space) and the remainder \$34,011 to an Undesignated Reserve for later designation.

Article 24:

The Community Preservation Committee has recommended that a total of \$35,000 in Community Preservation funds (\$5,000 from the Historical Preservation Reserve and \$30,000 from the Undesignated Reserve) be approved for the carpentry repairs and exterior scraping and painting at the Becket Arts Center (a Town owned building) at 7 Brooker Hill Road.

Article 25:

The Community Preservation Committee has recommended that a total of \$3,500 in Community Preservation funds (all \$3,500 from the Historical Resources Reserve) be approved for the purchase of two antique historic paintings one of Abel Dewey and one of Lydia Birchard Dewey, who have historic significance to the Town of Becket. The paintings once acquired will be displayed in Becket Town Hall.

Article 26:

The Community Preservation Committee has recommended that a total of \$29,000 in Community Preservation funds (all \$29,000 from the Community Housing Reserve) be approved for the use by the Board of Selectmen as matching funds for a Community Development Block Grant application to be used for Housing Rehabilitation by Becket residents. The funds available from the federal government if Becket is awarded this grant are \$600,000.

Article 27:

This Article is an addition to the Town of Becket By-Laws sponsored by the Bylaw Review Committee. This addition to Article 17 Town Betterment By-Law of the Town By-Laws will add a new Section 22 to protect the health, safety and welfare of the Town and its residents by requiring all owners of vacant properties to register them with the town and provide for the maintenance of these properties.

On 10/14/15, the Bylaw Review Committee discussed a Draft addition to Town Bylaws, Article 21-Vacant Properties that the Board of Selectmen agreed should be reviewed and worked on by the Bylaw Review Committee. It was originally proposed by the Building Inspector a number of years ago. Bill Girard, Building Inspector, attended a Bylaw Review Committee meeting to explain the process for inspections of vacant and abandoned properties and to answer questions. The intent of the Bylaw is for compliance and not punishment.

A Public Hearing regarding an addition to Town Bylaws, Article 21-Vacant Properties was held on September 14, 2016, at which time comments were received. The Bylaw Review Committee discussed these comments at their October 19th and November 16, 2016 meetings and addressed the concerns expressed at the hearing:

- Definition of the terms: vacant property (does not include seasonal absences), blight, local as 20 miles
- Concern about the requirement that utilities be shut off at properties vacant for six months or more and the provision that only a street address may be used for an owner registering a property, rather than a postal box.
- Notification to the property owner and whether it would be by certified mail.
- Would complaints have to be in writing?
- Fee for registering the property
- The bylaw should be explicit that work under a valid building permit would be exempt.

These concerns were incorporated into the proposed Bylaw and it was decided to add this as a new Section to Article 17 Town Betterment By-Law rather than creating a new separate Article for this Amendment. Proposed amendment is available at the Town Hall and on the Town website.

Article 28:

This Article is an amendment to the Town of Becket By-Laws, Article 20 Dog Control By-Law. The State Legislature updated the State Statutes pertaining to Dog or Animal Control laws and requirements of a local Animal Control Officer a few years back. The Bylaw Review Committee has spent considerable time and effort in updating our local By-Law so that this amendment (although fairly substantial) would be modernized and in compliance and conformity with these new Massachusetts statutes. Proposed amendment is available at the Town Hall and on the Town website.

Article 29:

Withdrawn.

Article 30:

This is a Zoning By-Law amendment sponsored by the Planning Board which would amend the existing Dimensional Requirements for Driveway permits in subsection 4.2.11. This amendment is sponsored by the Planning Board and addresses driveway access to public and private ways, access/location and site distances for the location of said driveways width/surface and drainage of construction of driveways, environmental impacts to the area a driveway is constructed and maintenance of the driveway curb cut and numbering of the residence. A special permit may be required from the Planning Board where conformance with these regulations is not possible. Proposed amendment is available at the Town Hall and on the Town website.

This is a petitioned Article requesting that the Town vote to authorize the Board of selectmen to petition the Legislature to enact amendments to the special act numbered 380 of the Acts of 1982 and entitled "AN ACT ESTABLISHING THE SHERWOOD FOREST ROAD MAINTENANCE DISTRICT IN THE TOWN OF BECKET."
